Frosig Features

Some journeys are just plain awesome, some emotional and tender. And then there are those both awesome and tender. I am not a time traveler in body form, but seem to be a time traveler in mind and spirit. Whenever I go to the island of Senja on the northern coast of Norway, far north of the Arctic Circle, I feel the presence of my ancestors. I can faintly hear their voices and laughter and singing float along with the breezes, sometimes I think feel their touch. I know them and their stories so well, my cousin says I am of the land. I belong.

I have just been on a journey like that during these past few weeks, only this time it was right here in Silverton. While preparing for the anniversary celebration, I spent many hours reading and researching and learning about life during our Charter member time 131 years ago. I have seen their faces and I know their names. I have seen old Silverton, its dirt roads and wooden sidewalks and crosswalks. I know how determined they were to have their own church. The congregation, the Ladies Aid, the Choir, the Young Peoples Society, the Girls Society, they were all busy and working for this new church.

What made this journey extra special to me was that it was the time of my grandparents at St. John's Lutheran church. Grandma wrote in her journal in the autumn of 1908, "Mother and I would go to the Ladies Aid, if it was in walking distance. We always had our meetings in homes at that time. The first time I wore my maternity dress I did not feel like facing the crowd, but Mother said, "Ah, just go on in". I had been the secretary since we were married, and had to stand up to read the report. I felt so awkward standing up in that dress, even though I was proud of it. I always brought some embroidery with me to work on if there wasn't something that had to be done at the meeting. Some of the young ladies started to tease me."

Your response to this anniversary celebration event has filled me with joy. From the old hymns at worship, to the Norwegian treats that filled the table, to the pictures and display items, it was a wonderful celebration of our beginning. And, it was my pleasure to be able to bring this story to you.

Now I have just read another story about the St. John's Ladies Aid Society that was not mentioned. They knew just one month after the church began in 1892, that what they planned to do for missions and their new church was going to take money. More than their 10 cent monthly dues could raise. They decided to have annual bazaars and dinners. They would all sew at their monthly meetings to be ready for the fall bazaars.

For many years their bazaars and dinners were held in a hall downtown Silverton. The new church building in 1898, it did not have a basement. They continued to carry the plates stored at the church down the hill to the hall for the dinners and bazaars. Women could also be seen walking from their homes to the hall while carrying food and their finest serving pieces. And then, it all had to be carried back up the hill again. Their footprints were everywhere.

Long before their footprints it was the Kalapuya who lived here in the valley. At one time there were 13 Kalapuya tribes and bands living in distinct areas of the Willamette Valley, referred to as the north, central, and south. They were a stable Native American society who harvested fruits and vegetables, and hunted and fished for their primary food. Living in villages scattered along the rivers and streams, one of the Central tribes called Ahantchuyuk lived along the Pudding River, east of the Willamette River above Lake Labish.

In about 1790, the Kalapuya people began suffering from diseases coming from the explorers and fur traders. Malaria, small pox, and other diseases came with the entry of Euro-Americans. The 13 tribes and bands of Kalapuyans declined to about 12 primary villages in the entire Willamette Valley. 20,000 Kalapuyans became 1,000 and they could not resist the settlements and the invasion that eliminated their resources and caused further declines due to starvation and diseases.

By 1820, French Canadians and retired employees of the Hudson Bay Company were settling here. The land of the Ahantchuyuk tribe became known as French Prairie. By 1840, the Kalapuya people were a trivial annoyance to the settlers who had taken their land and then employed them as laborers. By 1851, there wasn't any more land unclaimed by the settlers.

It is just such a sad story for Native Americans. I wish they could have had time together with our Charter members. Their footprints are side by side and now our footprints are there too. In 100 years or so, those like me who are always wondering, will certainly find our time to be loaded with issues and some craziness. But I hope they know that at our place we say All are welcome here.

We are beloved and blessed and grateful.

Treasurer's Corner

A year or so ago I started this 'Treasurer's Corner' to try to keep you all apprised of the financial situation of our church. Despite my good intentions, I have largely failed to keep this going on a regular monthly basis. My apologies for that! In a recent Adult Educational Forum, hosted by Pastor Leah, I was reminded that I wasn't writing these monthly updates. It was requested that I bring it back so as to keep our congregation fully updated on a more regular basis of the finances of ILC.

Immanuel's fiscal year runs from July 1 every year and runs until June 30 the following year. It is common that this time of the year, four or five months into the fiscal year, the church 'books' are struggling a bit. This year is no different, however, we are a bit more 'in the red' than we usually are.

Last month (October) Immanuel brought in a little over \$33,000. While that sounds like a lot, there are a ton of expenses going out of our church. Expenses for October were over \$39,000. We ran October at a loss. This isn't surprising though, so please don't get too worried...maybe just a little worried. Year to date, Immanuel Lutheran Church is -\$28,620.43. That means we have spent \$28k more than we have brought into the church.

As we enter the 'Giving Season' and the end of the year donations to lower those taxes, Immanuel is simply asking you not to forget about your church. Not surprisingly, the Christmas season and the end of the year is when we bring in the most money. We are always hopeful that the giving will get us back into 'the black' and will get us through the slow season of the first few months of the new year. So, as you prepare for the Christmas season and your end of the year donations, please don't forget about your church. Every penny will go towards getting us 'over the hump' and hopefully back into positive territory.

I commit to you all that I will make this 'Treasurer's Corner' a more regular part of the monthly newsletters to keep you all in the know about ILC's financial situation.
