Format

- Assembly in the choir room: songs and fellowship until 9:40(ish).
- Transition down to lower rooms.
- Teaching from 9:45am-10:05am (approximate).
- Activity from 10:05-10:25 (approximate).
- Kids grab a snack and head up to multi-purpose room to be picked up by parents/guardians.

Teaching Topics


1/7: The Cross 2/18: Ichthys and the Dove

1/14: Who was Martin Luther? 2/25: Baptism

1/21: Lutheran Rose 03/03: Scripture Alone 1/28: Triquetra 03/10: Faith Alone 2/04: Alter Items 03/17: Grace Alone 2/11: Communion -End for Spring Break-

Activity

1. After each lesson, students get a 4"x4" ceramic tile (each one individually numbered and on it, 1-96) and they draw or paint something that represents what they learned. If they have a fully blank tile, they have a full canvas to work with. If they have one with partial lettering, they draw/paint around (but not over) the letter. We will have a large board, 4'x3' in size, with a border attached to it ready for the tiles. As each tile is completed, we'll glue it in its place (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, etc.) When all tiles are completed, the message below will be spelled out in full, and the entire mosaic will be colorful with their images that represent what they've learned.



- During each activity session, we'll have a tablet set up on a tripod stand, just recording from the corner. When
 the whole project is done, we'll create a 2-minute video of the entire project that will be shown during a Sunday
 Service. When the video is over, the students will hold up and show everyone the fully completed board. We will
 then display the board, either temporarily or permanently, somewhere in the building.
- There will always be secondary activity ready for those who complete their tiles early.
 - Secondary activity #1: writing a short message and drawing a picture for a specific resident at either Mt.
 Angel Towers or Trustwell Living at Davenport Place; or
 - Secondary activity #2: fill a SACA donation bag of non-perishable food and personal care items that we
 will have ready to go in the Sunday School room.

Treasurer's Corner

A quick update on the financial picture at Immanuel Lutheran Church. The books are closed on November and we ended the month having spent \$2868.31 more than we brought into the church. This puts us in the red for the fiscal year (July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024) -\$31,488.74.

Even given that grim number, we remain optimistic and hopeful. A lot of financial giving happens every year in December. More people are typically at church in the holiday season, and we all have to make those year-end donations by December 31 for us to take advantage of them in our 2023 taxes. And we understand that certain people/families only give once a year, most often towards the end of the year in December. So again, we remain hopeful we will inch out of the financial hole we are currently in.

Just to make clear—even though we have spent \$31,488.74 more than we have brought into the church this fiscal year does not mean that we are not paying our bills. We have funds that sit in our checking account to ensure we're paying our bills. Those funds are not income to be spent, but rather, are allocated funds for certain committees or projects which haven't yet been spent. We just wanted to make clear that despite being 'in the hole' ILC is still able to pay our bills. However, we do need to stop the bleeding at some point during the year and we are hopeful this holiday season and end of year giving will get us over the hump. I am hopeful my message to you in January's newsletter will have much better numbers to share with you all.

Wishing you all a happy and healthy holiday season! Thank you.

Frosig Features - Hope and the Light

For those of us with a Scandinavian heritage, Santa Lucia is also part of our Christmas season's celebration. We know her because she was a girl dressed in white with a red ribbon at the waist. She wore a wreath on her head with seven candles to light her way, and took food and hope to the Christians who were hiding from the Romans in tunnels beneath the city.

"Santa Lucia, also known as Saint Lucy, was born around 283AD in Sicily, to rich and noble parents. Her father, of Roman origin, died when she was five years old, leaving her and her mother without a protective guardian."

There are several versions of Lucia as a Christian Martyr, one being that a disappointed suitor accused Lucy of being a Christian, which led to her execution. "In actuality, Lucy was probably a victim of the wave of persecution of Christians that occurred late in the reign of the Roman emperor <u>Diocletian</u>."

So why do Scandinavians celebrate a girl born in Sicily, you might wonder. It is said as traders began traveling to the north, they brought with them Christianity and this legend of Santa Lucia. Sweden was first to adopt this story of Lucia, and soon a festival of lights spread to what is now Norway and to the Swedish speaking areas of Finland. December 13th became Santa Lucia Day.

"Each town elects its own St. Lucia. The festival begins with a <u>procession</u> led by Lucia, who is followed by young girls dressed in white and wearing lighted wreaths on their heads and boys dressed in a white pajama-like costume singing

traditional songs. The festival marks the beginning of the <u>Christmas</u> season in <u>Scandinavia</u>, and it is meant to bring hope and light during the darkest time of the year."

For years I had gone with mom to watch Portland's Santa Lucia light the Christmas Tree at the Lloyd Center. Lucia also made appearances at many special Christmas events in the Portland area. When I was 22, my year had been sad and difficult. I decided I wanted to be Lucia and feel the joy. Little did I know there were a lot of girls who wanted to be Portland's Santa Lucia too.

Tryouts were tough. Interviews were in a huge room, by a panel of Rosarians in front of maybe 100+ other girls wanting to be Lucia. I felt so unprepared. Hopes were dashed, but those who did make it to the finalist stage seemed to all have long blond hair, and I had just cut mine short hoping to look older.

When it was time to light the Christmas tree at Lloyd Center, I was in the hospital in the pediatric ward because that is where you go to have your tonsils taken out. My hopes to be Lucia were replaced by a tonsillectomy, that kept me in pediatrics for four days. I was never in a crib like my roommates, and of course no one stayed as long as I did either. It was just before Christmas and it hurt to swallow so my eyes just cried. What a year. I wished Lucia would come visit me, bring some hope and the light, but that did not happen. Santa came. He brought lots of hard candy and a Ho Ho Ho.

Hope and the light of a bright star led the way to the manger. As Garrison Keillor tells in this Christmas story, "Mary held her baby son and wrapped him in strips of cloth and placed him in a manger. An Angel appeared to the shepherds tending their flocks in nearby fields. The shepherds were terrified, but the Angel told them not to be afraid and where they would find this newborn child.

The shepherds went and found the baby in the manger. They knelt-down and thanked God. How blessed they were, they didn't have to read about it in a book. They just came and they saw Him in the straw. Our new born King, first worshipped by common shepherds."

Now Christmas is near. Mary and Joseph are on their way to Bethlehem.

Much of the world however is caught up in shopping and sales and shipping dates, parties and party clothes, family gatherings some with drama, many where Merry does not come with Christmas, and then those who can hardly wait for Christmas to be over.

I pray for them to feel the light, to even notice the light. Hope Love Joy Peace are all there for everyone. May the hope of Christ's coming bring light to our darkness and renew our spirits. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

May your heart be filled with the love and grace of this newborn baby in the straw we call Jesus.
