### Meet Pastor Patricia Hughes



Reverend Patricia Wolf Hughes is an ordained ELCA pastor, with an M.Div. from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, California. A cradle Lutheran, Patricia met her first ordained woman in 1997, and applied for seminary in 2000. Patricia's work history is varied, both before and after ordination, and includes accounting and group facilitation. As Interim Campus Pastoral Leader at Northern Arizona University, prior to ordination, Patricia had her first taste of ministry. Serving after ordination, as pastor in Yucaipa, California, and following a year long Clinical Pastoral Education training in San Antonio, Patricia served as Palliative Care Chaplain at Peace Health in Springfield, Oregon, and qualified for her Board Certified Chaplain credential. Patricia retired from full time ministry following 7+ years at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Salem in 2021. Patricia has 2 children, Christopher and Faith, as well as one grandchild, Maddy. Previously widowed, Patricia is married to Reverend Joseph W. Hughes, and enjoys his children and grandchildren as well. Patricia spends her time gardening, reading, traveling, and leading worship for churches in the area as a substitute. Patricia and Joe have two dogs, Sassy and Niceaux and 3 chickens.

During Pastor Leah's upcoming sabbatical, I have the opportunity to serve Immanuel (along with my friends and colleagues Pastor Joe Medley and Pastor Manuel) in worship ministry, confirmation, and caring for folks during this time. I have been a member of Immanuel for 3 years, having retired from a pastoral call at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Salem. My spouse, Pastor Joe Hughes (he is a Missouri Synod Lutheran pastor) and I have lived in Silverton for just over 5 years — and we love it here. I have the opportunity to serve churches on a weekly basis as what we call a "supply pastor" — kind of a pinch hitter (I do love baseball references!)

While I am with you during these 2 months, you'll find I'm a little different from Pastor Leah, and Pastor Manuel, and really any pastor. We are each just people, with our own skills and strengths (weaknesses too). I am excited about being with the confirmation class and leading the young people in a conversation and exploration of the Sacraments, as well as the Ten Commandments. (Confirmation is a two year program, and last year the group studied the Bible). As I have thought about those topics, I am continually led to thoughts about the Holiness of God. Attending worship, for me, has always been an encounter with the Holy (even though sometimes the concerns of life keep me from noticing). So I have been thinking about worship, and congregations and holiness. I hope you'll come along with me as we talk about holiness during this time set apart! Because you see, though Pastor Leah is the one going away and is intentionally encountering different experiences, different moments, as part of her own life journey, you and I, and anyone who comes along will have different experiences too. I hope we can talk about holiness, and how we feel it at church (or not), how we encounter it in our lives, and what God is teaching us about ourselves and our world as we encounter the Holy.

## Director of Visitation Ministry

### Did Ya Know?

One of our newly adopted goals is to expand communication avenues to provide clear and consistent information. Based on feedback from the Listening Season, people wanted to understand more about the business side of our church. This relates to our goal, "ILC will expand communication avenues to provide clear and consistent information. The Council will be contributing to the monthly newsletter, sharing some information that people may not be aware of, particularly regarding the business side of the church.

For our first article, **did ya know** that ILC tithes 10% of all offerings and monetary gifts? The funds are distributed monthly with each organization receiving a percentage of the month's offerings.

We distribute these funds to three non-profits in Silverton.

- **3% Silverton Area Community Aid (SACA)**, whose mission is to improve lives by providing food, services, and access to community resources.
- 2.2% Sheltering Silverton, whose mission is to collaborate with neighbors and organizations to provide a framework that supports, develops, and provides services to vulnerable neighbors in order for them to transition towards fuller security, stability, and purpose within our community.
- **5.4% ARK** is an ILC ministry that provides food, snacks, and various other needs to students who may be in need.in the Silver Falls School District.

Through the Oregon Synod, we support:

- **70% Oregon Synod Region 1** is comprised of the Alaska, NW Washington, SW Washington, NW Intermountain, Oregon, and Montana Synods. The participating synods and the churchwide organization share funding according to a mutually agreed-upon allocation of funds.
- **4.2% Lutheran Community Services NW** partners with individuals, families, and communities for health, justice, and hope.
- 5.2% Lutheran World Relief tackles global poverty by helping people adapt to the challenges threatening their livelihoods and well-being. Their goal is to help people build self-sufficiency and create new community-owned approaches to problem-solving that will last long after our projects end.

For the math brains, the 10% tithe is completed with 10% added to a Council Discretionary Fund.

#### Cleaning the frig and food stewardship

One of the monthly kitchen tasks is cleaning the refrigerator. It is always sad to fill the garbage can with expired and/or spoiled food.

We look first for food spoilage – and these are immediately discarded.

We look at how the food is marked. If food is not spoiled and <u>marked with someone's name and a date</u> – we do save it.

Now we come to the difficult part – how to determine unsafe food. This food that is not labeled and is at or beyond the expiration date marked on the container.

In 2021 Marion Polk Food Share published a list of foods for use in food banks, not which foods could be consumed past the posted expiration date. A copy of this list has been added to the kitchen appliance drawer.

The <u>real dilemma</u> faced by the kitchen crew is that refrigerated foods that are safe past the expiration date <u>require</u> that the food is refrigerated the entire time.

Food in a church kitchen is moved in and out of refrigeration frequently. Consider a container of coffee creamer. The creamer is taken out of the refrigerator when Sunday coffee hour is set up and returned an hour or two later. And the container is handled by multiple people. This is done over and over.

Opened coffee creamer, as well as dairy milk and creamer, is only good for a few days past the expiration even when refrigerated. And the risk of spoilage increases if the product is out at room temperature.

This is a frequently discarded item, and we encourage the use of individual creamer containers to reduce waste. Other frequently discarded items are partial open containers of condiments that have been in and out of the refrigerator unknown number of times.

The kitchen crew would like to encourage people to NOT leave food in the church refrigerator <u>unless there is a planned future use.</u> OR please mark the food with your name or church group; and it will be saved for you if it is not spoiled.

It is a sad thing to fill a garbage can with food that might have been better used. Be a careful kitchen steward.

Family in Norway went on a 3-week trip to Kenya last year. From their pictures each day, I was on their trip in Kenya too. It was amazing. A few days ago, I got to see the summit of Mt. Hood on a bright sunny day. Pictures and stories told, open up my world to so many adventures.

The pictures of Mt. Hood triggered a memory of a wonderful mountain adventure many years ago. It all began because I said yes to being a guide for a blind skier. I was still new to cross-country skiing, downhill was my favorite, but I wanted to help. Ski for Light was a new program in the Sons of Norway community. On that first Saturday of Ski for Light, I was introduced to a guy, about my age, named Doug. I was to be his guide. We sat together on a school bus full of skiers, half sighted and half not.

When we arrived at the Stampede Pass exit off I-90 in Washington state, skiers and their equipment were unloaded. A bright blue snowcat named Ole was there to take us to the Sons of Norway lodge called Trollhaugen. When we were waiting for our turn to ride on Ole, I asked Doug what I needed to know or to do to be his guide. He had what is called tunnel vision. In my red jacket, as long as I stayed in his vision tunnel he could see me. If I was going to move to the left or right, I needed to tell him so his vision did not lose me. If we were walking side by side, he just needed to touch my elbow.

One weekend during our ski season was an overnight at the lodge. This is where a bus load of skiers became community and family. I stood alone by a wall just watching everyone. These new friends without their precious sight were so full of joy for being on the mountain, gratitude for us as their guides, and happy to share time with other non-sighted people. One played the piano, about seven people were standing around it singing in harmony. They put their arms around each other and nearly stood on their tiptoes to sing from their heart. There was a table with many enjoying their sandwiches and sodas. They were telling stories and jokes and laughing almost hysterically. Made me laugh too. A few sat in the corner by the window on cozy chairs reading with their fingers. All I could say was Thank you Lord for bringing me here.

By evening I had forgotten they could not see. There was a dance which included polka dancing. That comes with dancing quickly in circles. No shoes were allowed. They loved dancing the polka. Of course, since they could not see, there was a lot of bumping into each other but no one fell. The next morning there were a few black eyes. I thought I had two broken toes. Couldn't get my ski boot on. However, the joy and excitement continued all the way home on the bus. Our ski season together was absolutely supercalifragilisticexpialidocious!!!

When the next ski season came, we did it all over again.

I did try skiing with my eyes shut to know how it was for them, but it wasn't very long before I had to take a peek to see where I was going. Some of my new skier friends had sight once upon a time and then lost it, some were born without it. But they sure knew joy and gratitude and happiness. My life became richer by sharing time with them.

Community families, be it by blood or by love, are so important to our lives. God did not create us to be alone. What we give each other in love and service and compassion, keeps us healthy and happy and joyful. The best way to know is to understand, and that's what community gives us. And then we are part of the story that lives on through memories and pictures.

We are all God's children, and very special in our own uniqueness.
