Pastor's Ponderings

Just Pondering...

Marchining

The 2025 Women's Retreat has come and gone but the theme is still echoing, 'The Kingdom of God has come close.'

We unpacked biblical stories of Face of God sightings, asking why God comes close and what such an experience might look like. Finally, we shared some of our own Face of God, Kingdom-come-close encounters.

As it turns out, the people back home in Silverton, at Immanuel, where treading on similar ground. Your guest preacher shared his journey to the pulpit and how God showed up in the scripture, having a word for his life that was clearly intended to be passed along to you.

Have you every wondered who writes the Prayer of the Day or the Gospel Acclamation for each Sunday? Have you ever wondered, why are we read that First Lesson or who picked that Gospel passage? The answer isn't the office of Pastor Leah. Since Immanuel Lutheran Church is part of the Oregon Synod, which is a part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The ELCA produces a Sundays and Seasons: Guide to Worship Planning for each church year. Sundays and Seasons supports comprehensive week-by-week planning with content and ideas for liturgy and music, preaching and visuals, shaped by the Revised Common Lectionary, the church year, and the assembly gathered around word and sacrament. This is done for several reasons:

- 1. To have a shared worship identity so worshippers to feel connected across congregations.
- 2. A shared liturgy helps ensure that the theology being expressed in worship aligns with Lutheran beliefs.
- 3. A shared liturgy helps with faith formation for people to become familiar with scripture, creeds, and theological themes through repetition.

That said, while the core structure is shared, many congregations incorporate local elements, such as musical styles, language adaptations, or cultural customs, so there is still room for contextual expression within the framework.

The **Mission Endowment Fund of Immanuel Lutheran Church** is pleased to announce the recent award of two \$1,000 grants.

Church of the Living Waters (ELCA), Burns, Oregon

Areas of Harney county suffered a serious flood event. Starting in March, a combination of historic rainfall and rapid snowmelt, exacerbated by warmer temperatures, overwhelmed the Silvies River and its protective levees; one levee failed.

The highly destructive flood damaged hundreds of homes – including on the Burns Paiute Reservation. Waters also inundated the parish hall for the Church of the Living Waters - an ELCA congregation on the Paiute Reservation, led by Pr. Matthew Littau. A check was sent to Church of the Living Waters for their immediate use.

<u>Lutheran Disaster Response's work in Gaza</u>

The ELCA, alongside many other people of faith, have done and continue doing front-line relief work in Gaza healing and recovery. This accompaniment is critical to the lives of those who have survived more than a year and a half of violence and displacement.

Immanuel's Mission Endowment Fund was established to receive gifts, particularly bequests and memorials. These assets are deposited or invested to generate a strong long-term income stream. Earnings are used to make grants to mission projects beyond the doors of Immanuel Lutheran Church. In this way, we welcome, accept and encourage all people, not only in Silverton, but around the world, all God's children.

Frosig Features

The front yard here is not very big, and it is divided in the middle by a walkway from the front porch to the sidewalk. So, the front yard is now referred to as the eastside and the westside front yard.

I asked the landscapers for a garden pathway from the westside gate to the front gate. The stepping stones they used are much bigger than what I was thinking, but it is awesome. So that being the focal point on the westside, what should the focal point be on the eastside? Well, a Gnome house of course with the White Pine tree called Angel Falls right behind it. And so, the Gnome house and the Gnome village on the hill in the eastside yard began.

As I sat on the ground this week in front of the new Gnome house I had two thoughts - 1. The Gnome family who will live here is going to love this place. And 2. I hope I can finish painting the front and back of this roof before my legs fall asleep from sitting on them.

The base of the Gnome house is a piece of the fir tree that stood in my grandparents' yard 100 years ago up on East Main near Steelhammer. The fir tree is in many of our old family pictures, and looking up from Oak Street it was easy to see where their house was because their tree was the tallest on the hill.

One time when I came to visit Silverton, I couldn't see the tree. The top had been cut off. I felt awful. After the 2021 ice storm I saw the tree in pieces on the ground, so I had to stop and inquire about that. I was told the tree was not well, so it was cut down just before the ice storm. A really nice teenager named Sam put a piece of the tree in my car, and now it will be a Gnome house in this yard just a mile away.

Another thought came to me as I was sitting there on the ground making a garden of white flowers for the Gnome Mom who would live here. What would Grandma Hanson think now to see me sitting on the ground making a house for Gnomes out of her tree? First, she would giggle and smile, and then she would say - I love it.

In a month, on June 28^{th} , we will have another Hanson Family Reunion here in Silverton. Some travel a great distance to come gather with family for this important special time. As 1^{st} cousins, there were 20 of us growing up and knowing each other. Now there are $13 \, 1^{st}$ cousins, and many more 2^{nd} cousins than there are 1^{st} cousins. Plus, a lot of 3^{rd} cousins and even some 4^{th} cousins.

Grandma has left us a precious legacy, and she wrote her entire life down on paper so we know her words. My hope has always been that everyone in this family will know who they are. And know this place where it all began in 1906, when a first-generation Norwegian immigrant from North Dakota named Thorbjørn Hanson met Inga Marie Andreassen, a new Norwegian immigrant, at a Norwegian picnic at his house up on East Main (then called Broadway).

And, what would Grandma say about her family now? She would say Thank You Lord.

The roots of my family are the roots of my joy. I know how blessed I am to be able to say that, and I am so grateful.

Thinking of my mother, I wonder how many times she said to me - Go outside and play. That's what kids did then. It always called for some creative thinking. There was that fence on the other side of our street where I could go ballet dance across the top of it from one end to the other and back. And I did have a bike and a pair of key skates. Of course I had a collection of rocks, some sticks, lots of paper, and scraps of fabric under my bed.

Someone gave Dad a tether ball. He was creative. He cut a wooden plug to put into the end of a pipe and screwed a big eyelet into the plug. Then tied a rope to the eyelet and the other end of the rope to the tether ball. Next, he dug a hole in the ground and put a tin can in it. Packed the dirt in tightly around the tin can and put the pipe pole end into the can. Well, the pole didn't stand exactly straight. It wobbled when the ball went around it. Sometimes I just knew I could give that ball a perfect hit. Then came a wobble and the ball hit me on the head. But thank you Dad. It was a good try to make our tether ball fun to play.

He also gave me an old wind-up alarm clock, with the rounded glass front, that didn't work as a clock anymore. Wow, that was great. I sat on the porch and designed a spaceship. Using a shoe box and parts from the alarm clock, I thought if this was bigger it might get to the moon. The rounded glass became the front window of the

cockpit, so the Captain and the Navigator would have a clear view of what's ahead. Little wheels and springs from the clock were attached to the side walls with purpose. Wish I still had that spaceship. My memory tells me it was quite amazing.

Seems the creative part of me had a lot of nurturing in those early days. But then, Grandma Hanson could knit, crochet, spin, weave, and paint with oils. Dad's printing and drawings were amazing, and he played the accordion. Mom was creative too. She took a tailoring class and could sew anything, and she taught the three-year old's class at Sunday School. In church, Dad drew cartoon faces on his bulletin to keep us quiet during worship. Mom wrote parts of the sermon in short-hand on her bulletin. With the pew rack pencil, I filled in all the O and o letters and 0 numbers on my bulletin, and then I had to write how many of each O o and 0 I found.

So why not be a Senior Citizen sitting on the ground making a Gnome house out of a chunk of fir tree and an A-frame roof. It's a creative pondering project, and it makes joy. Better than reading those headlines. Oh, it also creates Gnome stories to tell others when they look over the fence to see what the Gnomes are doing in their town.

Happy creating joy time, whatever that means to you. And, Bless you for sharing your joy with others.
